Promoting an Understanding of the Values which Underpin British Society

As a Catholic school our mission is to live out the values of the Gospel which emanate from Jesus' law of love and his guidance about how we are called to treat one another: respect for the life and dignity of each individual, trust in God; honesty, compassion, forgiveness, mercy, community, servant leadership, equality, simplicity, justice and peace. These values are embedded in all that we teach and are promoted in all of our interactions with others in the school and the wider community.

The values which underpin our community at St. Joseph's School in Epsom are those which we know will prepare our children to live in the wider society of Great Britain in the 21st century. We fully recognise and embrace the multi-cultural, multi-faith and ever-changing nature of the United Kingdom and are committed to ensuring that everyone in our community is happy and free from intimidation or radicalisation by others who might wish to influence them. The staff are vigilant and monitor carefully relationships and behaviour which might be detrimental to the safe and happy development and growth of every member of our community.

Our commitment to those values permeates all aspects of school life: our policies, relationships and curriculum. On a weekly basis, in PSHE lessons, children explore many themes which are relevant to this area. In addition, we plan specific events and activities designed to focus the children's minds on key areas in order to heighten their awareness of the values.
