School Mission Statement:

Our Mission

- *We are all amazing in our own way.*
- *We look after the wonderful world that God created for us.*

Introduction

The context of this prayer and liturgy policy

'The celebration of Catholic liturgies and prayers as an integral part of the learning and teaching should enable the school community to become reflective, experience the presence of God and should develop a mature spiritual life.' (Marcus Stock (2012), *Christ at the Centre*, Catholic Truth Society, 23.)

Statement of requirement

The law requires all maintained Catholic schools to provide an act of daily collective worship (prayer and liturgy) for all pupils, including those in the sixth form (Section 70, 1988 Education Act) that is in accordance with the rites, practices, disciplines, and liturgical norms of the Catholic Church (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, schedule 20; Instrument of Government, clause 2). Academies in England are required by their funding agreement and Articles of Association to comply with similar requirements (*The Mainstream Academy and Free School: Supplemental Funding Agreement*, December 2020; *Model Articles for Catholic Academies*, February 2019).

The law requires all maintained schools to recognise and respect that parents have the legal right to withdraw their children up to the age of 16 from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1A)). Sixth-form pupils can choose to withdraw themselves from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1B)). The school's provision for prayer and liturgy will fulfil pupils' entitlement to experience the range of liturgical treasures of the Church, including a shared repertoire of prayers and liturgical music with which pupils in the school will be familiar.

Prayer and liturgy are not designated curriculum time. In the context of the Catholic school, this means that times of prayer and liturgy are not considered to be part of the allocation of curriculum time for Religious Education.

Prayer

At St Joseph's, we aim to nurture and strengthen our school community's relationship with God by valuing and respecting the power of prayer. At St Joseph's we offer our school community a wide and varied opportunity for prayer throughout the day and school year. We provide many opportunities for prayer in different forms, such as class liturgies, worship through song, sharing the Rosary, and whole-school worship. Children also have the opportunity to pray and offer personal intentions in our Holy Hallway, a special space for quiet reflection and connection with God. We help our pupils understand that prayer can be both formal and informal – a way to speak, listen, and respond to God in their own way. As a school, we pray together at key times during the day: at the start of the day, before lunch, and at the end of the day. Children are taught to make the Sign of the Cross and to know by heart key prayers including the Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be. They are also encouraged to pray the Rosary and to learn and participate confidently in Mass responses. During Advent, we send a travelling crib home with each family in the school as a way of preparing and helping them understand the liturgical season.

Collective Worship

It is the aim of St Joseph's Catholic Primary School that Collective Worship (Prayer and Liturgy)

places Christ at the heart of our community and enables all pupils and staff to encounter God through prayer, scripture, and reflection. Prayer and Liturgy are central to the spiritual life of the school, fostering moral and spiritual development and strengthening the sense of belonging within our Catholic community. Through shared acts of worship, we seek to nurture a deeper relationship with God, promote the Gospel values of love, service, and compassion, and encourage all to reflect on their experience of faith in daily life. Collective Worship also forms pupils and staff to participate more fully in the liturgical life and mission of the Church, helping them to live out their vocation as children of God in service to others.

Mass

Throughout the year, pupils participate in Mass at St Joseph’s church. They take an active role through altar serving, proclaiming the word, music ministry through choir and band and welcoming during the mass. The school leads key masses throughout the year. See table below

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Year groups also visit St Joseph's church throughout the year for weekday mass with the parish.

Sacred Spaces and Physical Signs

The school has a dedicated prayer garden which the children are able to access during their lunchtimes as well as a place for classes to gather for their own liturgies.

The school has a dedicated memorial garden within the school meadow memorial garden which is a quiet space where we have memory benches, with plaques for school family members who have died.

Over time, children, staff and governors have created an extensive Way of the Cross in the school grounds. Classes take responsibility for looking after their allocated station. Named the 'Via Dolorosa', it is a beautiful and spiritual experience which is used throughout the year. All children are invited to 'walk the way' during Lent with their families.

Resourcing

Prayer and liturgy are central to the school's understanding of itself as a Catholic school, and this is reflected in the annual budget allocation and available resources, including staff time, chaplaincy provision, and dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy.

The Catholic character of the school is reflected in religious artefacts and images on display throughout the building and external environment. Dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy will reflect the Church's liturgical season, Catholic Social Teaching principles and the Religious Education Directory.

Staff training and formation costs will be funded separately to ensure that all staff are able to fulfil their responsibility to contribute to the prayer and liturgical life of the school.

Responsibility

Governance

The governors, as guardians of the Catholic school's life and mission, have a responsibility to ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- there are named people who are responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school (the Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator)
- the prayer and liturgy policy is updated annually and shared with all stakeholders
- there is a budget for prayer and liturgy that reflects its centrality to the life of a Catholic school.

Headteacher

The headteacher, as the spiritual leader of the school as a Catholic community, ensures that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line
- with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- they work in partnership with the leaders for prayer and liturgy
- those responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school have been given appropriate training and formation to ensure that all guidance is followed and adhered to
- there are suitable resources for prayer and liturgy in the school.

Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator(s) – (Rachel Wheeler and Elaine Tobitt)

Those responsible for prayer and liturgy ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- there is an Annual Plan of Provision for prayer and liturgy across the school year which identifies liturgical seasons and key celebrations, as well as opportunities for the celebration of the Sacraments
- there is daily planned prayer for all pupils, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy are appropriate and readily available to staff and pupils
- induction on prayer and liturgy takes place for new members of staff as required
- staff have access to effective training and formation opportunities
- monitoring and evaluation of prayer and liturgy take place regularly and feed back into planning for future liturgies
- monitoring of prayer and liturgy is reported to the headteacher and governing body as necessary to support whole-school development and the Catholic life of the school
- there is collaboration with local clergy and parishes
- liaison with the Diocesan Advisory Service and others is maintained to ensure they keep updated with best practice.

Training and formation

All new staff will be supported during induction and beyond, so that they fully understand the responsibility they carry within their individual role for leading prayer and liturgy in the school. Any individual training needs will be identified and addressed through training and formation. There will also be the opportunity for whole-staff professional development at least once a year, so that all staff understand the importance of prayer and liturgy and relevant staff are well supported to lead as required.

Monitoring and evaluation

Monitoring and evaluation of the quality and impact of prayer and liturgy will take place regularly, and at least annually, and involve all key stakeholders: pupils, parents, staff, clergy, and governors. Areas for development will be identified and issues raised will be actioned and evidenced as appropriate.

Review

The policy will be reviewed as part of the regular cycle of policy review conducted by the governors.
